## Introduction:



Many of the 'simple' basic things in life we tend to take for granted - our health, family, friends, accommodation, our livelihood - until they are brought to our attention or taken away. The decline in economic activity has dominated everyone's thoughts over the year, with words such as recession, slump, downturn, bankruptcies, depression, redundancy, cut backs, uncertainty, homeless, unemployment, risk, becoming part of everyday vocabulary. Even before the current economic crisis, and in an era of apparent prosperity or boom, too many families were being marginalised, their health, wellbeing and life chances damaged or challenged by exceptionally high levels of poverty.

High levels of poverty are linked closely to high inequality; wealth and opportunity are often disproportionate, whilst others are left without very basic needs. Tackling inequality must be part of the solution to addressing poverty.

"We make a living by what we get; we make a life by what we give." Winston Churchill

Yet these are hard times. Giving or giving thanks in hard times can be difficult, in the midst of an economic recession that's had a devastating impact on many: a situation which unfortunately also impacts on the Voluntary Sector. Although arguments abound as to the causes of economic depression and possible strategies for tackling recession may vary, most people recognize there is a need to get to a better balance.

"It's time we admitted that there's more to life than money and it's time we focused not just on Gross Domestic Product but

on GWB - General Well-Being...Improving our society's sense of well-being is, I believe, the central political challenge of our times." David Cameron 2007

Ten years ago, the then Prime Minister, Tony Blair, made a commitment to eradicate child poverty. Following this pledge, the Government implemented social policies that helped reduce the number of children living in poverty. It has been well documented that reductions in child poverty have been slow; meeting the 2010 target means investing in family incomes, at a time of increased hardship.

Haringey is the fifth most deprived borough in London and the 18th most deprived in England. Unemployment is higher in the east of the borough, with 7.8 per cent of the working age population in the Tottenham ward claiming Jobseeker's Allowance in February 2010 - the highest figure in London. This is a contrast between the more affluent areas in the west of the borough, which include Highgate, Crouch End and Muswell Hill.

There is a high demand for housing; this is reflected in high house prices and a growing housing register of more than 20,000 households. However, many Haringey residents cannot afford to purchase a home. The current safety net leaves many families struggling well below the official poverty line, with some families excluded from access to publicly funded support.

The number of homeless households in Haringey living in temporary accommodation is consistently the highest, or second highest in the country:-3,547 households in March 2010. Haringey's Housing Strategy



2009-2019 sets out the Council's ten-year vision to create 'neighbourhoods that people choose to live in with a balance of homes which offer quality, affordability and sustainability for current and future generations.'

It is within the above context that CARIS continues to address and meet the needs of homeless families in Haringey, providing families with the appropriate support, advice and sign-posting that they need.

CARIS has continued to engage and work in partnership with Haringey's Homelessness Strategy 2008-2011 to improve the quality and suitability of temporary accommodation, safeguard children and vulnerable adults, and improve customer service, involvement and satisfaction.

In the year under review CARIS has delivered on its core aims and objectives. Families continue to be at the heart of the initiatives undertaken by the organisation, and central to the CARIS ethos. Our staff have worked hard and responded admirably to the growing workload and increased pressure due to the demand and multiple natures of the issues faced by families.

Development of CARIS Starfish Project, to provide emergency or interim housing and support for homeless families continues. The development of this project however, has been impeded by external economic factors, including cuts and reduction in capital funding. CARIS continues to seek an appropriate viable property for this project and secure sustainable income and resources.

For those fortunate people in this recession who still have food in the fridge and a home to put the fridge in, even though we may have personal reasons to feel vulnerable or deprived in our own lives, actively working for positive social change will necessarily involve each of us playing our part.

Change does not only start from the top. It also starts from the bottom, and we all need to get involved in whatever ways we can to respond to our society's needs and to improve its sense of well-being. These are challenging times. If we rise to the challenge we will not only make a difference to our own lives, but also change the lives of others.

In 2010-11 CARIS will focus on:

Starfish project: to purchase the property, and form procurement contracts

Strengthening our partnerships

Developing partnerships with Universities: "widening participation"

Increasing user and volunteer involvement

Thanks are due to all our staff, partners, volunteers, the wider community and all our funders for your support, which has enabled CARIS to achieve the organisation's objective of making a difference for homeless families in Haringey.

## Achievements and Performance: The Project

The project continues to work with homeless families within the borough, both indigenous and those who have recently arrived in the UK, asylum seekers, and those who have refugee status.

The table below gives a breakdown of the numbers of household in various forms of temporary accommodation in the borough Haringey. This demonstrates the vital need for CARIS services.

We have continued to consolidate our work with and on behalf of homeless families living in temporary accommodation within the Borough of Haringey. The last year has seen a comprehensive procedure and policy review of all service provision and of CARIS's organisational structure.

In February 2010 we were audited by the Community Legal Services (CLS), Office of the Immigration Services Commissioner (OISC) and awarded Quality Mark Standard for General Help with Casework in the following fields: Welfare and Benefits, Housing, Immigration and Nationality, Refugees and Asylum Seekers, Race Equality, and Women.

The key elements of the service continue to be:

## Family Support

This provides outreach visits to people's own homes; CARIS's Family Support Worker and Advice Workers have visited households who have been newly referred to CARIS by health professionals, social workers, or Children Centres professionals, and who are in need housing advice due to disrepair, overcrowding, or multiple occupancy. 86 families living in temporary accommodation were assisted by CARIS's Family Support Worker, and over 150 food parcels distributed to families who have no recourse to public funds; in addition, families received support with baby clothes, pushchairs, Moses baskets, blankets, cots and bedding.

CARIS's Family Support Worker also worked in partnership with Noel Park Children's Centre to deliver a pilot project, Safe At Home, a national home safety equipment scheme in the Noel Park ward of Haringey. The scheme was established by the Royal Society for the Prevention of Accidents (RoSPA), the aim being to raise awareness of safety at home and to provide free safety equipment to reduce the rate of accidents in children under 5 living in temporary accommodation. There is evidence to suggest that children living in disadvantageous conditions have a higher incidence of accidents in the home. In keeping with CARIS's remit, the purpose of the project was to support vulnerable families in Haringey who were living in temporary accommodation. Families living in temporary accommodation frequently live in unsuitable housing, and overcrowding is a concern for 20.9% of these families living in Haringey. This negatively affects home safety.

## Drop-in

The stay-and-play session has continued to develop: 345 parents and 438 children attended the CARIS drop-in, over 30 children and parents regularly attended. The drop-in offers a safe environment; stimulating play through sand, water, painting, puzzles, music and story time, and large equipment for mobility, balance and social interaction addressing the different stages of a child's development. The sessions have also been used to encourage parents to play with their children and communicating the importance of play to a child's development. The clothing exchange continues to operate alongside the drop-in, offering good quality baby clothes, and other essential items for families who do not have the money to purchase these.

Parent attending the drop-in families that would benefit from attending these programmes) were encouraged to participate in two community nutrition programmes: Shape Up and Cook & Eat. Both of these courses were delivered in partnership with NHS Haringey dietetic service. The Shape Up project encourages life-long changes to parents' weight and health, while Cook and Eat enables parents to adopt a healthier lifestyle through sensible eating, and cooking balanced meals on a limited budget or with limited facilities.

## Advice Service

407 homeless households received assistance and advocacy from CARIS' Advice and Outreach workers by appointment. Workshops were also held in a Haringey primary school: 56 parents attended. The priority for all those seen was to increase their knowledge and understanding of the benefits system and of their rights relating to work, housing, benefits and immigration, and to give advice and assistance on access to services in Haringey. The advice workers have continued to maximise benefit uptake by new arrivals in the UK and families who have found it difficult to navigate around benefit rules and current legislation. 127 referrals were received from statutory and voluntary organisation requesting support for client with multiple and complex issues, a high percentage requesting assistance for families with no recourse to public funds and newly arrived immigrants in the UK.

CARIS's Advice workers have developed a working partnership with the Markfield Project (a community centre based in London Borough of Haringey, which promotes rights, independence, choice and inclusion for disabled people and their families: The partnership combines the skill and experience of both organizations' staff, working together to ensure that the most vulnerable families with disabilities and housing problems are.

The Advice Workers have also continued to contribute to the policies that affect homeless families and newly arrived immigrants in Haringey, including, when necessary, challenging the Council's housing and homelessness practices; they have attended liaison meetings where they have advocated better services for users, as well as working with other advice providers in Haringey to address the increase in demand for advice in the current economic crisis.



## Mobile Toy Library

This has continued to provide a much-needed free loan service of toys and books to children and their families, 195 children (including 67 regular users) have benefited from the Mobile Toy Library: this is a significant number. A number of families who had previously used the toy library service have moved out of their hostel accommodation, due to changes in the family's needs. We are aware that hostel provision for families in the borough is changing, and that a number of hostels have been closed and families offered alternative housing options. The toy library continues to be the bridge, for families with young children who are isolated, to the opportunity to access and take up other services.



## Christmas Playscheme

60 families, including 104 children aged 0-14years, attended. We provided the opportunity for cross-cultural interaction: 14 nationalities were represented. We were able to give every child a present, and food parcels to families, through the generous giving of local churches and individual donors.





This has offered a wide range of themed activities and workshops staffed by trained play/youth workers, specialists in different areas of expertise, supported by adult and youth volunteers. As usual, it was held in July and August, with a series of morning and afternoon workshops. The theme of the Playscheme this year was The Rhythm of Life, looking at different types of rhythms, not just in music but in life, such as life cycles, physical and emotional cycles, different beats, heartbeats, biorhythms, rhythm in movement, in dance, in different cultures. Visual rhythms: on stage, in animation, in early visual sequences: praxinoscopes, zoetrope, optical toys, kaleidoscopes, photography, Rhythm in words.

There were all day trips to Margate, Brighton (a full day at the beach) and Legoland (a full day of amusements, rides on the train and visit to the animal farm, 162 children and their parents attended the summer playscheme. Language barriers were broken by trust games and musical games. The whole group worked together to produce a fantastic drama and dance presentation on the last day. Face painting was incorporated into this, and children designed their own characters, facemasks and costumes.

# WORKING IN PARTNERSHIP

CARIS is committed to partnership, working with statutory, voluntary, community and faith organisations



## Working in Partnership

CARIS has continued to develop partnerships and networking with community and faith groups. CARIS is working in partnership with local schools to provide information workshops on housing rights and basic immigration to parents of pupils attending the schools. CARIS advice workers have also delivered training workshops and presentation to Family Support Workers and mentors attached to local schools on Homelessness and on the needs of Asylum Seekers and Refugees within the Borough of Haringey.

CARIS's public-voluntary partnerships include relationships with public authorities responsible for health, housing, welfare, social services and children's services. These arrangements enable us to make contact with potential clients and to make appropriate referrals to statutory providers and regulators.

**Haringey's Voluntary Sector Council – HAVCO:** CARIS's Director acts as a HAVCO representative on the Integrated Housing Board, which feeds back to Haringey's Strategic Partnership Board.

**Haringey Homeless Strategy Steering Group** – staff continues to be involved in the implementation of the borough's Homelessness Review and Haringey's Housing Strategy 2009-2019. It sets out Haringey's approach to housing over the next ten years. The strategy is for stakeholders across the entire spectrum of housing-related activity in the borough, including the Council, registered providers of social housing, developers, private sector landlords, owner-occupiers, residents, and voluntary and community sector providers.

## ESOL Classes

At Entry level 1, 2 and Literacy, our classes continue to attract a large number of students from among CARIS's clients. Our partnership with the College of North East London (CONEL), which provides us with ESOL teachers, has ensured the stability of this service in the community, which is vital. Nine of the students regularly volunteered at CARIS, and were given help to access further training through the college or other courses they were interested in attending, such as ICT training, Book-keeping and Accounts, and Child Care training courses.

We have involved our users and volunteers in the planning and development of our services, to ensure that all our services meet the needs of the homeless families of Haringey. The shortages of permanent housing stock within the Borough mean families with young children are destined to stay longer in temporary accommodation.

Our staff are a professional team, committed to working within the borough as an expression of Christian social concern, to see change, to bring solutions to injustice in the community and individual lives, regardless of faith or racial background. The staff continue to extend their skills to remain relevant to community needs, keep abreast of changing legislation, local government policy, best practice and quality assurance.



It has been great working with CARIS over the last 3 years. Throughout the development of our Homelessness Strategy and since its launch in 2008, CARIS have been genuine partners who have not only taken an active part in delivering the homelessness strategy action plan but have also worked beyond this to help us improve our services. Just a few examples of how CARIS worked with us include; Chairing one of the Homelessness Strategy Delivery Groups and thereby significantly contributing to the actions being met; helping us to recruit key strategic staff; facilitating workshops; piloting new ways of working with voluntary sector groups and highlighting where outreach work could benefit homeless households (leading to much closer working with schools).

CARIS's contribution has been invaluable and a major factor to the improvements we have seen over the last 2 years. Together we have been able to deliver better outcomes for our clients and I look forward to working with them in the future and building on our successes so far.

Volunteers & Placements

CARIS continues to engage more people, from wide communities in Haringey promoting volunteering; providing volunteering opportunities within the various sections of the services provided by the organisation. Volunteering is an integral part of CARIS service delivery and without our volunteers we would not be able to continue to extend the reach of CARIS services.

This year we worked in partnership with University of Brighton, Central Saint Martins (University of the Arts), Cambridge and Middlesex Universities in developing highly successful work placements. We also provided volunteer work placement for students on degree courses at BA and MA level; NVQ training courses. All work placements involved pre-placement preparation and continuous support is provided throughout.



Working with CARIS Advice service has made a definite difference to the quality of support we are able to offer to families in the Noel Park area. Both the Family Support and the Outreach Workers have planned joint intervention with local families which has often resulted in improved living conditions for the whole family and improved outcomes for the children.

In a area of high mobility and poor housing stock like ours, this partnership has been vital and has empowered families to find their own voice.
